✓ Crews regained line clearance on 20 spans of overgrown vegetation. The more aggressive trimming approach will reduce temporary outages and wildfire risk.

Enzo is from Durango High School and will be studying Electrical Engineering.


On receiving the LPEA Scholarship: "This scholarship will support me in my journey to higher education, helping me choose my college based on quality, not just the price tag."

Katie is from Bayfield High School and will be going to Lineworker School at Colorado Mesa University.


