TARGET: EXPERIENCE NO LOST-TIME INCIDENTS OR ACCIDENTS

✓ No lost-time events in September.

TARGET: ACHIEVE 100% REGULATORY COMPLIANCE

✓ Achieved 100% compliance in September.

TARGET: EXPERIENCE NO CYBER INCIDENTS THAT DISRUPT BUSINESS PROCESSES

- ✓ No cyber incidents in September.
- ✓ Replaced aged hardware and updated underlying software that support virtual computing infrastructure. This improves performance and reliability for mission critical servers.
- ✓ Updated the multifactor authentication method used by contractors to remotely access LPEA's systems. This update utilizes a more modern and secure multifactor authentication protocol to protect against cybersecurity threats.

TARGET: COMPLETE 5 MAJOR CONTINUOUS IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

- ✓ Cost-of-service study
 - Submitted over 75% of requested data.

KEEP THE LIGHTS ON

TARGET: COMPLY WITH LPEA'S WILDFIRE MITIGATION PLAN

- ✓ Crews replaced 12 broken or reject poles and installed 5 raptor protections. Two broken poles were vehicle caused and 3 were broken from the storms.
- ✓ Vegetation management crews continue to focus on heavily overgrown areas on Spring Creek circuits up Florida Road.

TARGET: MEET 2024 CAPITAL PROJECT'S SCHEDULE AND BUDGET

- ✓ As of the end of September, 65% of the Capital Projects Budget work has been completed.
 - Lake Forest Cable Replacement Complete
 - Electra Lake In progress
 - Lake Purgatory In progress
 - Silverpick Line Rebuild In progress
 - Bootjack In progress
 - Lake Hatcher In progress
 - Jack's Pasture Cable Replacement In progress.

10% will not be completed due to State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) but is counteracted with work we moved ahead in schedule. 30% may not be completed in 2024 due to large project delays with Animas Valley, Trujillo Substation, and Durango Mesa.

TARGET: ACHIEVE SAIDI/SAIFI TARGETS

- ✓ Met SAIDI and SAIFI goals for September.
- ✓ Crews responded to 65 unplanned outages. Heavy thunderstorms contributed to the majority of the problems.

SOURCE CLEAN, LOCAL, LOWEST REASONABLE COST POWER

TARGET: CONTINUE TO MAKE PROGRESS ON LPEA'S POWER SUPPLY STRATEGY

✓ LPEA took a significant step forward in its power supply strategy by announcing an agreement with Mercuria Energy America LLC (Mercuria) to secure reliable power supply following the termination of services from Tri-State, effective April 1, 2026. This strategic collaboration demonstrates LPEA's commitment to ensuring a smooth transition and maintaining a stable energy source for our members.

TARGET: CONTINUE TO PURSUE LOCAL, CLEAN POWER PROJECTS

- ✓ Enrolled members in Sunnyside Community Solar subscriptions:
 - Offered 100% of the capacity for general membership subscriptions to the program and finalized 80% of agreements with 131 members still on the waiting list.
 - Offered 96% of the capacity for income qualified member subscriptions and finalized 69% of agreements.
- ✓ Initiated permitting and environmental work for the Powering Affordable Clean Energy (PACE) award from the United States Department of Agriculture.

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TARGET: ACHIEVE IMPROVEMENT IN **OVERALL MEMBER SATISFACTION**

TARGET: STRENGTHEN PARTNERSHIPS AND INCREASE STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT

- ✓ Hosted our annual meeting, bringing together members, staff, and key stakeholders in the electric cooperative community. The meeting featured updates on LPEA's 2023 achievements and future plans. Our Board of Director election results were also announced at this event.
- ✓ Kicked off our 85th anniversary and celebration by recognizing the Florida Grange #306 as our longest-standing member since 1939. In appreciation of their role in supporting our cooperative, LPEA presented a commemorative check at their annual pancake breakfast. This milestone reflects our long-standing commitment to community partnerships.

TARGET: POSITION LPEA AS AN INDUSTRY LEADER THROUGH PUBLIC AND MEMBER **ENGAGEMENT**

- ✓ The Colorado Chapter of Women in Energy held their Annual Luncheon to celebrate the 2024 Kelly de la Torre Scholarship Fund recipients on September 27th in Denver. Elizabeth Howe was one of four women in energy invited to share their inspiring story and offer a thoughtprovoking challenge for the chapter attendees to reflect on and embrace in their lives.
- ✓ Dominic May hosted a session at the Rocky Mountain Utility Exchange on Electric Vehicle (EV) charging in multifamily homes.
- ✓ Dominic also spoke on Virtual Power Plants (VPP) at a national Grid Forward (GridFWD) event where he connected with the CEO of the California Independent System Operator (CAISO), CEO of the Western Power Pool, and the COO of the Southwest Power Pool (SPP). These types of engagements greatly expand LPEA's positive reputation as an innovative industry leader and we are seeing tangible results.

✓ No updates in September.

TARGET: PURSUE AND IMPLEMENT GRANTS TO SUPPORT LPEA INITIATIVES

✓ Finalized plans to apply for the Innovative Queue Management Solutions (iQMS) for Clean Energy Interconnection and Energization funding opportunity in partnership with the National Renewable Energy Laboratory (NREL). This opportunity could lead to the development of a software tool to avoid prohibitively expensive custom assessments by quickly analyzing interconnection requests that have failed the initial screening process.
