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TARGET: STRENGTHEN WILDFIRE PREVENTION AND GRID RESILIENCE THROUGH PROACTIVE MITIGATION STRATEGIES AND INFRASTRUCTURE ENHANCEMENTS

✓ Crews changed 17 poles and installed 7 raptor protections throughout the service territory.

TARGET: LEVERAGE TECHNOLOGY TO IMPROVE OPERATIONAL SAFETY, EFFICIENCY, AND PROACTIVE MAINTENANCE

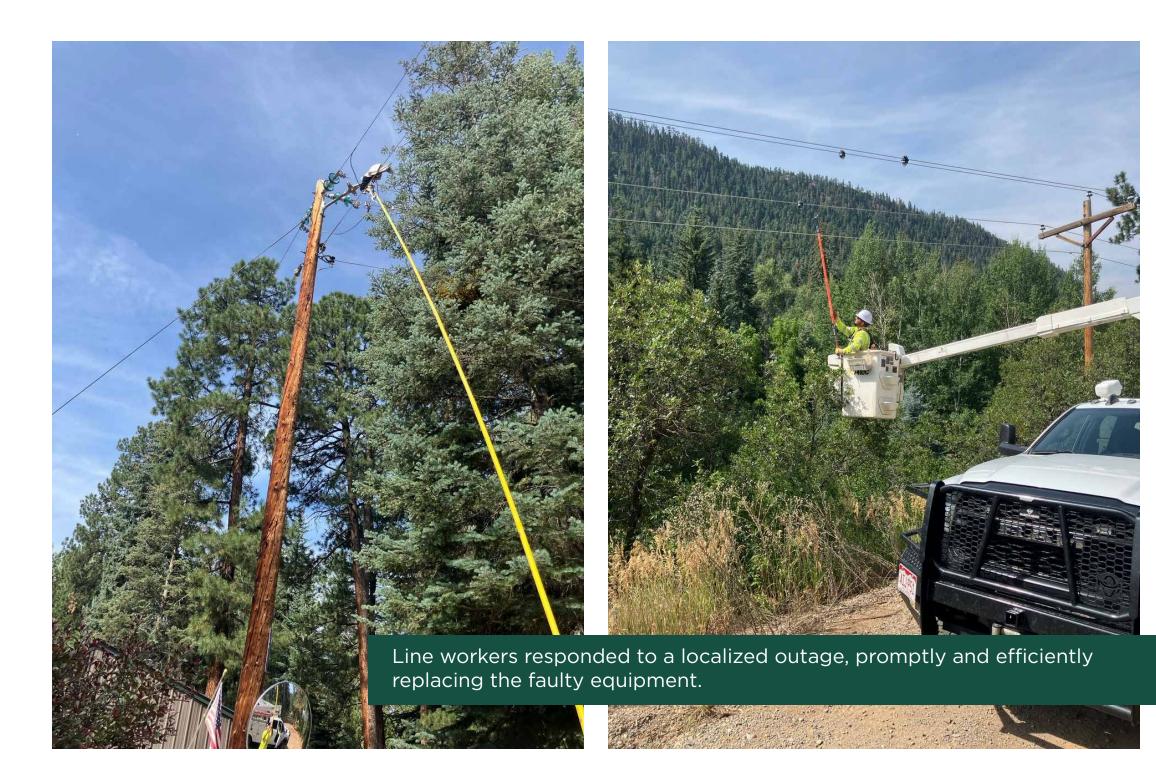
✓ Identified Red Flag Warnings via the Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) system and enabled the implementation of fire settings to mitigate fire ignition risk.

TARGET: INVEST IN CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS TO MODERNIZE THE GRID INFRASTRUCTURE, INCLUDING UPGRADES TO SUBSTATIONS, TRANSFORMERS, AND TRANSMISSION LINES

- Completed helicopter operations at Silverpick, just south of Purgatory Resort, to upgrade infrastructure from single phase to three phase for improved reliability. This work included replacing poles and pulling wire.
- ✓ Completed the Yucca Estates underground line replacement project, greatly improving reliability in the area.
- ✓ Completed installation of electric fencing on three additional substations. Five substations already have this fencing around the power transformer to deter animals from climbing on top and creating outages.

TARGET: ACHIEVE TARGETED IMPROVEMENTS IN RELIABILITY METRICS, REDUCING THE FREQUENCY AND DURATION OF OUTAGES THROUGH SYSTEM UPGRADES, PREVENTATIVE MAINTENANCE, AND ENHANCED EMERGENCY RESPONSE

- ✓ Exceeded SAIDI and SAIFI goals for July.
- ✓ Crews responded to 75 unplanned outages, mostly due to wildlife encouters and high winds.

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APRIL VERSUS AUGUST





Completed the Los Ranchitos right-of-way clearing project which involved removing a total 409 trees and trimming 231 trees across a total of 10.31 acres in the Los Ranchitos subdivision. This neighborhood has experienced the most tree-related outages over the past five years compared to other subdivisions in our service territory.

This project was partially funded by a \$50,000 grant from the Colorado Department of Natural Resources through the Colorado Strategic Wildfire Action Program (COSWAP)
