WATT'S UP APRIL 2021

In the wake of February's rolling blackouts in Texas, LPEA has been fielding questions on the reliability of our power supply now and into the future. Some people blame an overreliance on renewables as the primary cause of the Texas outages and worry that LPEA's shift to low-carbon energy will mean less reliable power in the future.

LPEA's VP of Grid Solutions, Dan Harms, penned a great op-ed on this topic, which appeared in The Durango Herald on February 27th, but I think many points bear repeating.

ONE: the outages in Texas were not solely the fault of renewable energy technologies. Freezing temperatures caused issues with supply infrastructure across energy technologies including natural gas, coal, and wind.

TWO: the Texas scenario is very unlikely to happen here in Southwest Colorado for two primary reasons. First, unlike Colorado which uses freezeprotection devices, Texas was not prepared to deal with the impacts of freezing temperatures on its energy infrastructure. Second, Texas operates its power grid largely independently, meaning it has less options to secure back up power. Colorado is part of the Western Interconnect grid, the largest and most geographically diverse grid in North America, which helps us deal with regional events more effectively.

THREE: LPEA aims to reduce our carbon footprint 50% below 2018 levels by 2030 by adding more carbonfree power sources to our energy portfolio. While some of this carbonfree energy will come from traditional renewables like solar and wind, we will also continue to use dispatchable generation (resources like natural gas that can be ramped up and down as needed) to balance the intermittency of renewables.

FOUR: though LPEA will continue pursuing our carbon footprint goal, we will NEVER sacrifice reliability to get there. 100% renewables is simply not feasible right now, and we have not set that as a target, because we still lack the technology to achieve it.

FIVE: the second part of LPEA's Strategic Goal is to achieve this carbon footprint reduction while also keeping electric rates lower than 70% of our Colorado cooperative peers. This means any future power supply options selected by the board will be less expensive than our current portfolio. Our mission remains to supply you affordable, reliable, safe, and low-carbon electricity.

- Durango School District 9-R has been awarded up to \$328,803 to purchase and install a fully electric school bus and related charging infrastructure, thanks to a joint grant application by the school district and LPEA. They were one of eight grant awardees out of 38 total applicants. The 81-seat bus is expected to be operational by the fall of 2021.
- Two bill-assistance efforts lead by LPEA have disbursed nearly \$65,000 in funds to support more than 860 LPEA members in need.
- Durango's first-ever electric vehicle DC fast-charging station is coming to the Durango Transit Center parking lot by June 2021. Co-funded by the city, the Colorado Energy Office and LPEA, the station will allow up to two vehicles to charge simultaneously, delivering a full charge in approximately 20 minutes. By comparison, the Level 2 charger takes roughly four hours to deliver a full charge.
